> THE ART OF TRIAGE

This lecture will cover some of the more commonly seen veterinary emergencies (Urinary obstruction, Trauma, V/D, etc...) There will be a focus on utilizing critical thinking skills to ascertain the best course of action for veterinary technicians dealing with emergencies. Attendees will gain an understanding of how to "sort" or "triage" presenting cases in order of priority to maximize and improve patient outcomes. Case examples will be presented to give attendees the opportunity to work through the potential diagnosis and treatment of specific scenarios.

BOOM SHOCK-A-LOCKA

The technician's role in managing patients in shock is vital to successful patient outcomes. This lecture will discuss the pathophysiology of shock. We will go over the various types of shock as well as the different stages of shock our patients may be dealing with. Our main focus will be on the technicians role in managing patients in the various types of shock states.

> THE DREADED BLUE DOT: OH NO! PARVO POSITIVE!

A discussion of Parvovirus starting with the pathophysiology of the disease including transmission, incubation periods and preventions. We'll discuss diagnostics and monitoring of our parvo patients. We'll talk about the different treatment options like medications and advanced catheter/feeding tube placements. At the end we will have a fun discussion dispelling some of the internet "myths" on how to treat parvovirus.
